MEDICAL AND SURGICAL HINTS.

1. **Procrastination**—Is the thief of time; when injured do not "take a chance," have advice at once. By so doing you may save much suffering and many dollars.

2. **For Sprains**—Irrigation, emersion, or pack in hot water, complete rest; after swelling and pain lessen apply antiphlogistine. When swelling is well reduced strap injured part with o. z. (zinc oxide) adhesive plaster.

3. **For Dog Bites**—Cauterize with strong nitric or carbolic acid. If there cannot be had use a live coal or red hot iron. Dress antiseptically.

4. **For Insect Stings**—Apply locally aromatic spirits of ammonia, strong solution baking soda, and phlogistine.

5. **For Punctured Wounds**—Use a solution of bromine 1 to 50. Of this solution 1 teaspoonful to 2 ozs. of water, apply with wet dressing and keep it damp. Bichloride of mercury 1 to 5000 solution, dressing to be kept wet.

6. **For Hemorrhage Following Wound**—Do the safe thing; constrict the circulation both above and below the wound.

7. When your Hernia comes down and you can not reduce after trying for 10 minutes, a physician and a few whiffs of etheriform will do it for you.

8. **For Burns**—Home remedies are often most efficacious. First cover the burned area with swath (cable) oil, then apply plenty of baking soda and bandages. By the time the doctor arrives you may not need him.

9. **For Nose Bleed**—Ice to back of neck, sniff alum water, inhale spirits of camphor, plug nostrils with cotton saturated with diluted vinegar.

10. **For Fainting**—Fresh air, clothing loose, head low, give aromatic spirits of ammonia one-half to one teaspoonful in a swallow of water, also equal parts of whiskey and water.

11. **For Colic or Pain in Bowels**—Don't get "stage fright" about your appendix; take one or two tablespoonfuls of castor oil, followed by glass of hot water; repeat this dose in three or four hours if necessary. An occasional dose of this remedy "like mother used to give" may save your appendix from the hands of a surgeon.

12. Remember that alcohol externally is one of our best antiseptics. After scrubbing the hands, pour alcohol over them before you dress an open wound.

13. Remember, every "grip" should contain aromatic spirits of ammonia and a First Aid to the Injured package. They may be more essential than apparel.

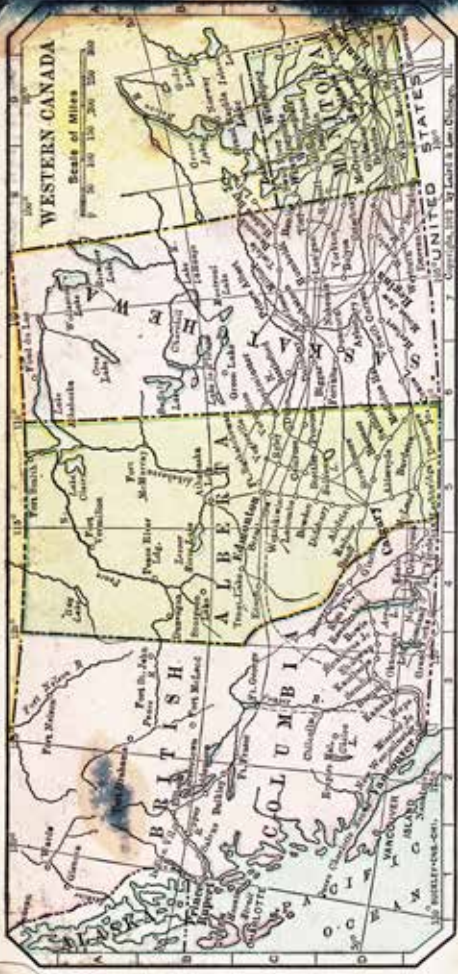

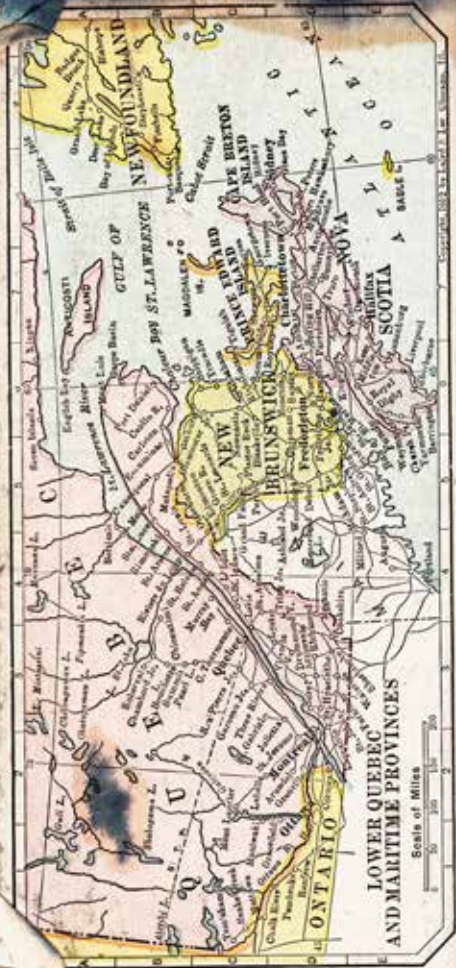

Business Laws.

Contracts made on Sunday cannot be enforced. Written contracts concerning land must be under seal. Notes do not bear interest unless it is so stated.

If a note is lost or stolen, the maker is not released if the consideration and amount can be proved.

Demand notes are payable when presented, without grace, and bear legal interest after a demand, if not so written.

An endorser on a demand note can be held only for a limited time, variable in different states.

To be negotiable a note must either be made payable to bearer or be properly endorsed by the person to whose order it is made.

If the endorser desires to avoid responsibility he can endorse "without recourse."

Notes becoming due on Sunday or a legal holiday are, as a rule, payable on the day following.

A note made on Sunday, or one dated ahead of its issue, is void, but it may be dated back.

If a note is altered in any way by the holder, it becomes void.

A note made by a minor is void in some states and is voidable on judicial decision in others.

A contract with a minor or a lunatic is void.

If a note is not paid when due, the endorsers, if any, should be legally notified to be holden.

A note obtained by fraud or given by an intoxicated person cannot be collected.

It is a fraud to conceal a fraud.

Signatures with a lead pencil are good in law.

The acts of one partner bind the others.

Each individual in a partnership is responsible for all the debts of the firm except in the case of a special partnership.

The word "limited" in connection with firm names indicates a limitation of responsibility for each member.

An agreement without consideration of value is void.

"Value received" should be written in a note, but it is not necessary. When not written it is presumed by law or may be shown by proof.

A consideration is not sufficient in law if it is illegal in its nature.

An endorser of a note is exempt from liability if not served with a notice of its dishonor within 24 hours of its non-payment.

If a letter containing a notice of protest of non-payment be put in the Post Office, any miscarriage does not affect the party giving notice.

Notice of protest may be sent either to the place of business or residence of the party notified.

A receipt for money is not legally conclusive.

Affords a cheap and convenient means for remitting small sums. They are sold and paid at more than 10,000 Post Offices in Canada. May be bought as quickly as stamps during all post office hours. Can be crossed to ensure safety.

1c on note for 20c, 25c, 30c or 40c.
 2c on note for 50c, 60c, 70c, 75c, 80c, 90c, \$1.00.
 \$1.50, \$2.00 or \$2.50.
 3c on note for \$3.00, \$4.00 or \$5.00.
 5c on note for \$10.00.

Odd cents may be made up by affixing Canadian postage stamps not exceeding 9c in value to the face of a postal note, if the same is for remittance in Canada.

Postmasters at all Money Order Offices in the United States will pay postal notes which are regularly drawn for payment at their respective offices. (If the payee resides in a city, the notes must be drawn on the Main City Office, not on a sub-office or station.)

Postage stamps must not be affixed to postal notes drawn for payment in the United States.

Canadian postal notes are payable only in Canada and the United States. British "Postal Orders" are redeemable at Head Office.

LEGAL HOLIDAYS IN CANADA.

PARCEL POST

WITHIN THE DOMINION.

Packets for transmission by Parcel Post will be accepted containing articles of mail matter as follows: Farm and factory products, merchandise of all descriptions, such as dry goods, groceries, hardware, confectionery, stationery (including blank books, etc.), seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, bedding plants, scions or grafts, and all other matter not included in the first class and not excluded from the mails by the general prohibitory regulations.

Third class matter may be mailed at parcel post rates or at the rates of third class matter, at the option of the sender.

The transmission of intoxicating liquors or explosives is expressly prohibited.

Parcels must be put up in such a way that the contents may be easily examined; and the sender's address should appear inside the parcel or inconspicuously on the cover.

The limit of weight will be 11 pounds.

The general limit of sizes is 39 inches in length by one foot in width or depth, but parcels may be 3 feet, 6 inches in length, provided that the combined length and girth do not exceed 6 feet.

The maximum charge of 12 cents a pound will apply on all parcels addressed to or posted at offices to which mails have to be conveyed more than 100 miles by a continuous stage service. The charge on any parcel, however, will not be greater than one cent an ounce.

PATTERNS AND SAMPLES

May be sent at the rate of 1 cent per 2 ozs. within Canada, but when addressed to other countries the minimum prepayment is fixed at 2 cents. Limits of weight and size:—

THE CANADIAN GOVERNMENT

The Governor-General is assisted by a Council composed of fifteen heads of departments of which the Premier is the President.

The other portfolios are: Secretary of State, Minister of Trade and Commerce, Minister of Justice and Attorney-General, Minister of Marine Fisheries and Naval Service, Minister of Railways and Canals, Minister of Militia and Defense, Minister of Finance, Postmaster-General, Minister of Agriculture, Minister of Public Works, Minister of the Interior, Minister of Customs, Minister of Inland Revenue and Mines, and Minister of Labor. The salary of each member of the ministry is \$7,000 per year, except the Premier, who receives \$12,000.

Legislative.

The Legislative department of Canada is composed of a Senate and House of Commons. There are now 87 senators and 221 members of the House distributed as follows.

The term of the Senators is for life, each receiving his appointment from the crown on the nomination of the Governor-General. The salary is \$2,500 with the exception of the Speaker, who receives \$4,000.

The members of the House of Commons are elected by their respective constituencies for a term of five years unless sooner dissolved. Their salaries are the same as those of the Senators, but the Leader of the Opposition receives \$7,000 in addition. \$15 a day is deducted for absences.

Judicial.

The highest court in the Dominion is the Supreme Court, composed of a Chief Justice and five judges, each of whom receives a salary of \$9,000 per annum, except the Chief Justice, who is paid an additional \$1,000. These judges have civil, criminal and appellate jurisdiction throughout Canada. From the decisions of this court the only tribunal to which appeal can be made is to the Judicial Committee of the Imperial Privy Council of Great Britain. The only other Federal Court is the Exchequer Court, presided over by a single judge, for trying cases connected with the revenue. Salary \$8,000.

Provincial Government.

The Provinces have each a separate administration at whose head is a Lieutenant-Governor appointed by the Governor-General. The provinces have full powers of local government. The organization of the legislative department varies in different provinces.

Indian Corn, 56 lbs. Rye, 56 lbs. Peas, 60 lbs. Barley, 48 lbs. Malt, 38 lbs. Oats, 34 lbs. Beans, 60 lbs. Flax seed, 53 lbs. Hemp, 44 lbs. Blue grass seed, 14 lbs. Lime, 70 lbs. Castor Beans, 40 lbs. Potatoes, turnips, carrots, parsnips, beets, 60 lbs. Onions, 50 lbs. Bituminous coal, 70 lbs. Clover seed, 60 lbs. Buckwheat, 48 lbs.

And the ton was decreed to be 2,000 lbs.
By recent Acts it is ordered that for apples the barrel shall be 96 quarts. Size, length, 28 inches between head (inside measure); diameter (head) 17 inches; middle diameter, 18½ inches. Boxes, 11x10x20 inches, containing 2,500 cubic inches.

CANADIAN POSTAL RATES.

Postal Cards.—1 cent each, go without further charge to all parts of Canada and the United States, Cards for British possessions and foreign countries (within the Postal Union) 2 cents each.

Local or "Drop" Letters—that is, for the city or town where deposited, 1 cent per ounce.

All Letters to all parts of Canada, the United States and Mexico, 2 cents for each ounce or fraction thereof. All letters to the United Kingdom and British possessions 2 cents per ounce or fraction thereof. Other countries in Postal Union 5 cents for first ounce and 3 cents each succeeding ounce or fraction thereof.

First Class—Letters and all other written or typewritten matter, whether sealed or unsealed, and all other matter, sealed or fastened in any manner so that it cannot be quickly examined, will be subject to the letter rates.

Second Class—Only from publishers addressed to regular subscribers and news agents in Canada, the United Kingdom and certain British possessions, $\frac{1}{2}$ cent per pound.

Newspapers, periodicals (regular publications) can be mailed by the public at the rate of 1 cent for each 4 ounces or fraction thereof to Canada, the United Kingdom, certain British possessions and the United States. And to all other countries in the Postal Union, 1 cent for each 2 ounces or fraction thereof.

Third Class—Printed matter, in unsealed wrappers only (all matters enclosed in notched envelopes must pay letter rates) 1 cent for each 2 ounces or fraction thereof, which must be fully prepaid. This includes books, circulars, chromos, engravings, handbills, lithographs, music, pamphlets, proof-sheets and manuscript accompanying the same, reproductions by the electric pen, hectograph, metallograph, pyrograph, and in short any reproduction upon paper, by any process except hand writing and typewriting, pass at the same rate as printed matter, provided at least 20 copies in identical terms to different addresses are handed in at the same time. Limit of weight, 5 pounds; limit of size, 1 foot by 30 inches.

Parcel Post within Canada includes farm and factory products and merchandise of all kinds admissible to the mails. Rates can be learned at any post office. Limit of weight, 11 pounds. Merchandise for United States 1c per ounce; limit of weight, 4 pounds $\frac{1}{2}$ ounces.

United Kingdom, Mexico, Jamaica, Bahamas, St. Lucia, Barbados, Leeward Islands, British Guiana, 12 cents per pound or fraction thereof. Limit, 11 pounds, 30 inches length, 12 inches width or depth. Combined length and girth, 6 feet. Golf sticks, umbrellas, etc., 42 inches length allowed. For other countries consult Postmaster.

Registration—5 cents in addition to regular postage.
